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THE MEDICAL EXAMINER**

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Examiner: Melissa Sims-Stanley, M.D.

REASON FOR PERFORMING AN EXAMINATION:

Johnny Hollman was a 62-year-old, black male (with a documented medical history of hypertension, chronic obstructive pulmonary disease, and diabetes mellitus) who became involved in a physical confrontation with law enforcement following a minor motor vehicle crash. Body cam video and discussion with GBI Special Agent Keshia Morris confirmed that the officer used a conducted energy device on the decedent. He became unresponsive at the scene and was transported to Grady Memorial Hospital, where he was pronounced dead in the emergency room on 8/11/2023 at 12:57 a.m.

SUMMARY OF FINDINGS:

- I. Use of conducted energy device on the decedent.
- II. Hypertensive cardiovascular disease.
 - A. Cardiomegaly (520 grams; expected heart weight based on height = 327 +/- 40 grams) with concentric left ventricular hypertrophy.
- III. Atherosclerotic cardiovascular disease.
 - A. Marked atherosclerosis of the left main coronary artery.
 - B. Marked two-vessel coronary atherosclerosis.
 - C. Moderate aortic atherosclerosis.
- IV. Chronic obstructive pulmonary disease.
 - A. Chronic bronchitis.
- V. Diabetes mellitus.
- VI. Obesity (Body Mass Index = 37.1 kg/m²).
- VII. Hepatomegaly (2160 grams).
 - A. Chronic passive hepatic congestion.
- VIII. Toxicology results per Axis Laboratories.
 - A. Peripheral blood delta-9 THC level = 20.6 ng/mL.
 - B. Peripheral blood delta-9 Carboxy THC level = 55.6 ng/mL.
 - C. Peripheral blood 11-hydroxy Delta-9 THC level = 3.0 ng/mL.
 - D. Peripheral blood cyclobenzaprine level = 23.0 ng/mL.
 - E. Peripheral blood naproxen level = 10.1 mcg/mL.
- IX. Laboratory results per Grady Memorial Hospital.
 - A. Hemoglobin phenotype = AA.
 - B. Vitreous fluid analysis is within postmortem values.
 - C. Blood hemoglobin A_{1c} level = 7.8%.
- X. Minor blunt force head trauma.
 - A. Facial abrasions.
 - B. Scalp/subgaleal and bilateral temporalis musculature hemorrhages.
- XI. Minor blunt force trauma to the torso and extremities.
 - A. Abrasions and contusions.
 - B. Superficial wound on volar right hand.

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- C. Cutdowns of the posterior torso and extremities reveal less than 10 foci of subcutaneous and superficial musculature hemorrhages (measuring up to 5.8 cm each).
- XII. Minor, miscellaneous injury.
 - A. Lingual hemorrhage.
- XIII. Injuries consistent with resuscitative efforts.
 - A. Soft tissue hemorrhages overlie the left superior horn of the thyroid cartilage and left greater horn of the hyoid bone (both of which are intact) and the thyroid gland.
 - B. Fractures of right anterior ribs #2-6, right anterolateral ribs #1-3, left anterior ribs #2-5, and left anterolateral ribs #2-4 with intercostal musculature hemorrhages.

CAUSE OF DEATH:

Cardiac dysrhythmia due to use of conducted energy device in association with hypertensive and atherosclerotic cardiovascular disease.

OTHER SIGNIFICANT CONDITIONS:

Chronic obstructive pulmonary disease; Diabetes mellitus; Obesity.

MANNER OF DEATH:

Homicide.

OPINION:

It is my opinion that Johnny Hollman died due to cardiac dysrhythmia (abnormal heart rhythm) due to use of a conducted energy device in association with hypertensive and atherosclerotic cardiovascular disease. Review of body cam video and discussion with GBI Special Agent Keshia Morris confirm that a conducted energy device is used as a stun gun during physical confrontation with law enforcement. Based on my review and interpretation of the video, Mr. Hollman is unresponsive from the time that the energy device is deployed. At no time is neck compression used, and based on the angle of the video, compression of the torso is not identified. Chronic obstructive pulmonary disease, diabetes mellitus, and obesity are contributory factors in this death.

The manner of death is classified as homicide.

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DATE, TIME, AND PLACE OF EXAMINATION:

Under the provisions of the Georgia Death Investigation Act, an autopsy is performed in the morgue of the Fulton County Medical Examiner's Center on August 12, 2023.

PRESENTATION, CLOTHING, AND PERSONAL EFFECTS:

The body is received supine in a white plastic disaster bag secured with a red plastic seal numbered 5917288. Attached to the plastic seal is a Fulton County Medical Examiner's Center identification tag with the designation "Johnny Hollman". Body identification also includes an identification tag (identifying the decedent by the stat pack name "Meyersdale 6, Emergency U") with attached string encircling the right great toe.

The body is unclad. Personal effects include an appropriately worn, yellow-metal necklace with a yellow-metal "J" pendant with clear stones. Clothing and additional personal effects are not received with the body. A pair of gray-metal handcuffs (with a cuff encircling the left wrist) is present. These handcuffs are removed at autopsy in accordance with office policy.

DIAGNOSTIC AND THERAPEUTIC DEVICES AND MARKINGS:

1. Supraglottic airway in oral cavity with loose strap.
2. Appropriately positioned cervical collar.
3. Defibrillator pad on the right chest and overlying the left anterolateral costal margin.
4. Automated external defibrillator pad on the central lower chest.
5. Multiple electrocardiogram pads on the anterior torso.
6. Peripheral intravascular line with overlying adhesive on the dorsolateral right wrist.
7. Contusion with associated swelling and puncture site (consistent with prior intravascular line site/attempt) on the left antecubital fossa.
8. Intraosseous line (with overlying taped gauze) on the proximal aspect of the left anteromedial lower leg.

POSTMORTEM X-RAYS:

The postmortem x-ray is reviewed.

POSTMORTEM CHANGES:

The refrigerated body is cool to the touch. Rigor mortis is generalized and fully developed. Violet postmortem lividity is posteriorly distributed except in regions of pressure. The corneas are clouded. The body is well preserved.

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FEATURES OF IDENTIFICATION:

The unembalmed body is that of a black male appearing consistent with the reported age of 62 years, measuring 68 inches in length and weighing 244 pounds. The decedent is well developed and obese, with a body mass index = 37.1 kg/m². The curly, white with interspersed gray-black head hair is in multiple braids measuring 3 inches in length. Facial hair consists of a vertical strip of curly, white-gray-black hair on the central chin (measuring 0.5 inch in length). The irides are brown. The natural teeth are in fair repair; multiple teeth are remotely absent.

Identifying marks and scars are not apparent. Nondescript scars overlie the right knee and distal lower extremities.

EVIDENCE OF ACUTE INJURY:

Minor Blunt Force Head Trauma:

A 0.5 x 0.3 inch, faint pink abrasion and few indistinct, pink abrasions (measuring up to 0.2 inch each) overlie the superomedial right orbital rim. An irregular, 1.1 x 0.5 inch, red abrasion and multiple satellite abrasions (measuring less than 0.1 inch each) span the nasal dorsum (predominantly on the right).

Internal examination reveals right frontotemporal scalp/subgaleal hemorrhages and scattered left temporal scalp/subgaleal and parieto-occipital scalp hemorrhages (measuring up to 4 x 4 cm each). Bilateral temporalis musculature hemorrhages are present. The neurocranium is intact, and the brain is atraumatic.

Minor Blunt Force Trauma to the Torso and Extremities:

A 7 x 3 inch, discontinuous aggregate of confluent and petechial, dark red contusions spans the superolateral left back. A vertically linear, 2.5 x 0.3 inch confluence of similar contusions is on the upper half of the lateral left back. A vertical and curvilinear, 4.8 x 0.3 inch, discontinuous aggregate of petechial and confluent, dark red contusions is on the posterolateral left torso. A 0.9 x 0.6 inch aggregate of similar, faint contusions is on the superomedial right back. An obliquely linear, 0.4 inch, dark abrasion is on the posterior right flank. An approximately 1 x 1 inch aggregate of faint red discoloration vs. contusions is on the superolateral right shoulder. Multiple, irregular red abrasions (measuring up to 0.9 x 0.8 inch each) overlie the right elbow. Indistinct, faint pink contusions span the dorsomedial right forearm. An essentially coronal, 0.7 x 0.2 inch, superficial dark wound is on the volar surface of the lateral right hand.

Multiple irregular, red abrasions (measuring up to 1.3 x 0.5 inch each) overlie and are distal and lateral to the knees. A 1.2 x 0.5 inch, reddish-brown abrasion is on the medial left knee.

Cutdowns of the back, buttocks, upper extremities, and posterior lower extremities reveal:

1. Scattered subcutaneous hemorrhages (up to 3.8 x 0.8 cm each) of the superolateral right back.

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2. A 5.8 x 3.3 cm focus of subcutaneous/superficial musculature hemorrhage of the superolateral left back.
3. Scattered subcutaneous hemorrhages (up to 1.3 cm each) of the posterolateral left torso and lateral left hip.
4. Subcutaneous hemorrhages (up to 3.8 x 2.5 cm each) overlying and distal to the right elbow.
5. Subcutaneous hemorrhage (2 x 2 cm) of the lateral right wrist.
6. A 2.5 x 2.5 cm, discontinuous aggregate of subcutaneous hemorrhages of the superior left shoulder.
7. Three to four subcutaneous hemorrhages (up to 2.5 x 2.5 cm each) of the distal aspect of the dorsal, left upper arm and lateral left elbow.
8. A 3.8 x 2 cm, subcutaneous hemorrhage of the medial left elbow.
9. A 3.8 x 3.8 cm, discontinuous aggregate of subcutaneous hemorrhages of the lateral right knee.

Minor, Miscellaneous Injury:

Bivalving the tongue reveals a 0.4 x 0.2 cm hemorrhage of the distal, right lingual musculature.

Injuries Consistent with Resuscitative Efforts:

Internal examination reveals soft tissue hemorrhages overlie the left superior horn of the thyroid cartilage and left greater horn of the hyoid bone (both of which are intact), as well as the left lobe of the thyroid gland. Right anterior ribs #2-6, right anterolateral ribs #1-3, left anterior ribs #2-5, and left anterolateral ribs #2-4 are fractured with associated intercostal musculature hemorrhages.

EXTERNAL EXAMINATION:

The head is normally formed. The soft tissues of the face and neck are mildly plethoric. The facial bones and mandible are free of palpable fractures. Ocular petechiae of the lower palpebral conjunctivae are present, and facial petechiae are absent. The sclerae are anicteric. The conjunctival blood vessels are congested. The nose is normally formed. The nasal vestibules are clear. The lips, teeth, tongue, gums, and buccal mucosa are unremarkable. The external meati, pinnae, and mastoid regions are unexceptional.

The trachea is in the midline of the neck. The neck is neither crepitant nor excessively mobile. No palpable masses are present.

The chest and back are symmetrical and well developed. The protuberant abdomen is free of palpable organomegaly. An umbilical hernia is present. The spine is straight.

The extremities are symmetrical and well developed. The appendicular skeleton is stable to manipulation. The hands and feet are normally formed. All the digits are present. The fingernails have irregular edges, extend less than 0.2 inch beyond the digit tips, and display focal underlying

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debris. The toenails have irregular edges, do not extend beyond the digit tips, and are variably thickened and discolored.

The penile foreskin is long, and the testes are palpable within the scrotum. The external genitalia, perineum, and anorectal areas are normally formed and atraumatic. The inguinal regions and buttocks are unremarkable.

There is no cervical, axillary, or inguinal lymphadenopathy.

INTERNAL EXAMINATION:

Head:

The scalp is reflected using the standard intermastoidal incision. The calvarium is intact. The dura is intact and free of discoloration and thickening. The base of the skull is examined after stripping the dura and is intact. The leptomeninges are thin and transparent. There is no epidural, subdural, or subarachnoid hemorrhage. The brain weighs 1040 grams. The gyri and sulci are of normal distribution and development. There are no lesions of the cortical gray ribbon, white matter, or deep gray matter structures indicative of natural disease processes. Neither brain swelling nor herniation is noted. The normally distributed blood vessels of the circle of Willis are free of atherosclerosis and aneurysms. The substantia nigra is normally pigmented. The cerebellum, brainstem, upper cervical spinal cord, and ventricular system are normally formed. The cerebrospinal fluid is clear.

Neck:

The skin of the neck is dissected to the angle of the mandible. No airway mucosal edema is present. The hyoid bone and laryngeal cartilages are intact. The epiglottis is neither inflamed nor edematous. No foreign objects are in the airway. The carotid vessels are pliable and patent. The anterior cervical spine and atlanto-occipital joint are stable to manipulation.

Chest and Abdomen:

The skin of the chest and abdomen is reflected using the usual Y-shaped incision. The sternum and chest plate are removed to reveal no abnormal fluid collections in the body cavities. No unusual odors or color changes are noted. Examination of the organs in situ reveals normal organ morphology and relationships. The intact diaphragm is normally formed. The organs are removed using the Virchow technique.

Cardiovascular System:

The heart weighs 520 grams (expected heart weight based on height = 327 +/- 40 grams) and exhibits normal four-chambered anatomy. The hypertrophied right and left ventricular walls are 0.5 cm and 2.0 cm in thickness, respectively. The muscular interventricular septum is 2.0 cm

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thick. The coronary arteries arise from their usual locations and ramify across their respective ventricles. The left main coronary artery is 90% occluded by eccentric yellow plaque. The mid aspect of the left anterior descending coronary artery and proximal aspect of the right coronary artery are each 75% occluded by eccentric yellow plaque. The epicardium, valve leaflets, chordae tendineae, and endocardium are normally formed. The pulmonic valve measures 9.0 cm in circumference at the annulus, and the tricuspid valve measures 12.0 cm in circumference at the annulus. The aortic valve measures 7.5 cm in circumference at the annulus, and the mitral valve measures 10.6 cm in circumference at the annulus. The red-brown myocardium is free of discrete lesions. The aorta and its normally distributed major branches exhibit a moderate degree of atherosclerosis.

Respiratory System:

The trachea, hilar structures, and major vessels are normally formed. The right and left lungs weigh 920 grams and 840 grams, respectively. The pleural surfaces are smooth. There is expression of blood and fluid from the congested and edematous parenchyma upon compression. Neither lung exhibits consolidation, thrombosis, embolism, infarction, or neoplasia.

Gastrointestinal System:

The esophagus is lined by unremarkable, tan-gray mucosa. The gastroesophageal junction is unremarkable. The gastric mucosa is normally rugated, and the stomach contains approximately 400 grams of thick, tan food matter. The small bowel, colon, and rectum are normally formed. The appendix is in the right lower abdominal quadrant.

Hepatobiliary System:

The liver weighs 2160 grams. The intact capsule is of normal thickness. The homogenous, red-brown parenchyma is free of mass lesions. The distended gallbladder contains approximately 40 milliliters of viscous, green-brown bile. The mucosa is unremarkable. No gallstones are present. The pancreas is of normal size, has the usual lobular architecture, and is free of fibrosis, hemorrhage, and fat necrosis.

Urogenital System:

The right and left kidneys weigh 140 grams and 120 grams, respectively. The capsules strip with ease to reveal underlying, smooth, firm, red-brown cortical surfaces. The cut surfaces, including the pyramids, pelves, calyces, and vessels, are unremarkable. The ureters are of normal caliber. There are no lesions of the mucosa, wall, or serosa of the urinary bladder, which contains approximately 60 milliliters of clear yellow urine.

The homogenous, tan-white parenchyma of the enlarged prostate gland displays nodularity. The testes are symmetrical. The light brown parenchyma is unremarkable.

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Reticuloendothelial System:

The spleen weighs 180 grams. The intact capsule is of normal thickness. The cut surface is dark red. The red pulp and white pulp are normally distributed. No focal lesions are present. Regional lymph nodes are unremarkable.

Musculoskeletal System:

The symmetrical skeletal muscles are normally formed.

Endocrine System:

The symmetrical thyroid gland is of normal size. The dark brown parenchyma is free of nodules, hemorrhages, and cysts. The adrenal glands are of normal size and free of hemorrhage and nodularity.

MICROSCOPIC DESCRIPTION:

Cassette Summary:

- A. Left anterior descending coronary artery, left cardiac ventricle, left lung.
- B. Right coronary artery, right cardiac ventricle, right lung.
- C. Spleen, pancreas, liver.
- D. Left lung, left adrenal gland, left kidney.
- E. Cerebrum, cerebellum, right adrenal gland, right kidney.
- F. Thyroid gland, prostate gland.

Cardiovascular System: The left cardiac ventricle shows plexiform interstitial and perivascular fibrosis, predominantly involving the inner one half of the ventricular wall. The left anterior descending coronary arterial section confirms atherosclerotic plaque formation. The right coronary arterial section is fragmented.

Respiratory System: The lungs reveal acute pulmonary congestion and edema. Hypertrophy of the bronchial mucous glands is present, consistent with chronic bronchitis. Bone marrow emboli within the pulmonary vasculature are noted, consistent with resuscitative efforts.

Hepatobiliary System: The liver contains sinusoidal congestion.

Urogenital System: The left renal section displays a subcapsular, wedge-shaped focus of glomerulosclerosis, tubulointerstitial lymphocytic infiltrates and fibrosis, consistent with chronic pyelonephritis. The prostate gland shows nodular glandular and stromal hypertrophy, consistent with benign prostatic hypertrophy.

The remaining histologically unremarkable tissue sections confirm the gross impression.

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OTHER PROCEDURES:

1. Peripheral blood and urine are submitted to Axis Laboratories for toxicologic analysis.
2. Vitreous fluid is submitted to Grady Memorial Hospital for electrolyte analysis and beta-hydroxybutyrate quantitation. Blood is submitted for hemoglobin A_{1c} evaluation and hemoglobin electrophoresis.
3. Two air-dried blood spot cards are retained in this facility.
4. Documentary and identification photographs are obtained.
5. Representative tissue sections are processed to slides in 6 cassettes.
6. Serum and archival tissue samples are retained in this facility.
7. The examined organs are returned to the body cavity.
8. The personal effect is released with the body.
9. Pulled head hair is retained in this facility for the investigating agency.
